From the Principal

"It is often said that a person's true character is revealed in times of adversity. I think this has definitely been exemplified for MEC in 2020. We have had a school year unlike any other we have ever experienced. It has challenged us all and forced us to find new ways of doing things, while at the same time it has taught us about ourselves and that which is important in our lives. Not only have we learnt about pandemics and epidemiologists and social distancing, we have discovered the true value of community and the lengths people connected to this school will go to keep others safe. This school community has met the challenge head on and come out at the other side stronger than ever.

I recall earlier this year watching a Four Corners episode on the coronavirus epidemic in China and Italy and was struck by the impact this new virus was having on those communities. It seemed to me their problems were a world away from us here in Maryborough. I felt sad for those countries but naively thought it would never be like that here. How things quickly changed. Before long, our lives had altered in ways that were hard to understand and at school we had made the sudden switch to remote and flexible learning. The students made the transition with such confidence, cooperation and optimism, it was a privilege to observe. The staff saw these unique circumstances as a challenge and within a week had remarkably switched to curriculum delivery through Microsoft Teams. Throughout all of this, our parents and carers provided support and care to their children, ensuring they had the opportunity to optimise their learning in what seemed like a new world and this was just for the first period of remote and flexible learning.


Some of the fun activities we experienced were canoeing, a night walk, the game of life and death, feeding farm animals, a long

Kinder to prep transition sessions are well underway and the children have enjoyed being able to visit and acquaint themselves with MEC!




Music Count Us In 2020

The Song writing Competition for 2021 BEGINS NOW, for any students from P-Year 12, with entries due February next year! A wonderful holiday activity for aspiring songwriters.

Music Count Us In Celebration Day 2020 took place on November 5th when schools from all over the country came together (online) to perform the 'SAME song, on the SAME day, at the SAME time'. The event saw hundreds of thousands of Australian school children unite as one powerful national voice in advocacy and celebration of Australian school music!

The 2020 event was broadly inspired by the program's core values of INCLUSIVITY, and EQUAL ACCESS; along with RESILIANCE – as shown by music teachers and students in a year of tough restrictions around music making during Covid. The 'Beauty of the Australian Landscape'; and the importance of 'Language Preservation' 'Sharing of Knowledge and Culture', and 'Caring for Country' also inspired the performances, presentation and event location choices.

Three featured performances of the 2020 Program Song 'You Won't Bring Us Down' were filmed from 3 unique and visually stunning Australian locations.

These served as an important reminder of the beauty of our country. Performances included an English Language version; an Auslan signed version and a Wajarri (indigenous) language version of the song.

These 3 performances ran one after the other and were livestreamed to hundreds of thousands of schools, teachers and students across Australia, who joined us online at 12pm to watch and perform the Song.

The *English Language* version of the song was performed and led from the beautiful Cairns Esplanade Lagoon (Cairns, QLD). Performers were the combined choirs of St Monica's College and Edge Hill State School with all choristers positioned in a physically distanced formation in and around the Lagoon. This performance was conducted by Chris Burcin. Cairns Mayor Bob Manning opened the performance with an Acknowledgement of Country and 'Welcome' to schools across Australia.

The *Auslan Signed* version of the song followed, and was performed from Sydney Harbour waterfront (Sydney, NSW) with the dramatic Sydney Opera House and a traditional 'Tall ship' in the background. Performers were the Signing Choir of the Royal Institute of Deaf and Blind Children's Thomas Pattison School conducted by Melina Williams. NSW Governor, Her Excellency, the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC delivered an Acknowledgement of Country and delivered a warm and heartfelt tribute to the resilience of music teachers who have continued to find creative ways to keep music going in their classrooms during Covid-19, despite being one of the hardest hit and adversely impacted EDU sectors, with bans and restrictions on singing, ensembles and wind/brass instrument playing. Hundreds of schools (particularly in NSW and Victoria) rehearsed and prepared the Auslan signed version of the song so that they could join the performance on Celebration Day without singing!

The *Indigenous Language* (Wajarri) version of the song was performed from the beautiful and culturally significant riverbank of Ellendale Pool, Yamatji Country (Mid-West region, WA). The translated song was titled 'Yamatji Remix', sung in a combination of Wajarri and English languages, and included indigenous instruments such as didgeridoos and clap sticks. Four local primary schools combined to rehearse and give this beautiful performance from the riverbank. These were Rangeway, Waggrakine, Beachlands and Allendale. This performance was conducted by Rachel Whealy. Local Elders Graham Taylor and Gloria Fogarty joined the students and delivered a Welcome to Country. They shared rich site-associated knowledge, culture and stories with the children, including the tale of the enormous river serpent 'Bimarra' who lives in the Ellendale Pool!

As the Music Count Us In 2020 program now draws to a close, the MCUI Team would like to thank all the schools and teachers who participated in the Program; our partner organisations and providers who contributed so enormously to the creation of the Program; and all those who performed so beautifully at our final Celebration Day event as they led and united schools across Australia 'in song' and powerful advocacy of Australian school music.



LC3 students have been busy making yummy dip for veggies and crackers. They have also been creating their own Christmas Trees using sticks and wool!












Year 9 Students Team Challenge





Matthew Dellavedova Scholarship

Matthew Dellavedova was born and raised in Maryborough, attending 404 Primary School and the Maryborough Regional College. He completed his last two years of secondary schooling in Canberra after gaining a Basketball Scholarship at the Australian Institute Of Sport. Matthew then completed four years at Saint Mary's College in California before becoming a professional basketball player. Earning a place in the National Basketball Association (NBA), he played for three years for the Cleveland Cavaliers and is currently playing for the Milwaukee Bucks. During this time Matthew has represented Australia on numerous occasions, playing in the Boomers Basketball team, in two Olympic Games; London in 2012 and Rio in 2016.

ADF Long Tan Leadership Award (2)

To assist students from each of the areas, Years 10 and 12, who have demonstrated outstanding qualities of leadership and teamwork within Maryborough Education Centre and the wider community.

To assist a student from Years 7-9 for academic achievement.

Rotary Club Scholarships (2)

Rotary is the world's oldest 'service club,' founded in 1905 in Chicago by 4 young men. Paul Harris is regarded as the founder and the idea of regular meetings became so popular it developed into a world-wide organisation with 1.2 million Rotarians in over 200 countries.

The first Rotary club in Australia was formed in Melbourne in 1921. The Maryborough Club formed in 1952.

Rotary as an organisation participates in a variety of programs – Youth, Vocational, Community and International. In support of local youth, the Rotary Club of Maryborough provides 2 scholarships to local students in memory of two past members.

Rotary Club: Charles Mowbray Art Scholarship

Charles Mowbray came to Maryborough as the manager of the ES & A Bank (now known as the ANZ bank) in the sixties, joining Rotary in 1965. Charles and wife Patricia had 4 sons, all of whom were educated at the Maryborough High School. Charles was a

highly respected member of the community and a dedicated Rotarian who was very interested in the Arts. It was Charles who fostered the annual Rotary Art Show. Charles was Treasurer of Maryborough Rotary from 1971 to 1976 and was recognized a Paul Harris Fellow in 1991. This Scholarship is awarded for artistic excellence to a VCE student. The **Paul Harris Fellow** recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have had contributions made in their name, of US\$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation. Both Charles Mowbray and Doug Hutchinson were recognized as Paul Harris Fellows by the Rotary Club of Maryborough.

Rotary Club: Doug Hutchinson Community Builder Scholarship

Doug came to Maryborough as the Vice-Principal of the Maryborough High School and was particularly keen to ensure that local youth had access to quality education. He worked tirelessly in this endeavour and was highly regarded within the local community and Rotary. He worked in many Rotary projects, particularly those involving the youth of the local area. Doug was President of Maryborough Rotary for the 1977/78 year and was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow. Doug enjoyed lawn bowls in his leisure time and his wife Jean was the first lady president of the Maryborough Highland Society. This Scholarship is awarded to assist a student at any year level who displays exemplary behaviour and ongoing commitment to the values of Maryborough Education Centre and the wider school community.

Memorial

Robert Astbury Memorial Scholarship (1948 - 2017) (2)

Robert Astbury was an Australian radio personality, television sports journalist and real estate agent. Rob Astbury was born in Avoca and attended Maryborough High School. He was a conscientious student and a very keen sportsman with a real talent for distance running and football. He had a great loyalty to his school and established this scholarship when he began working in the media in Melbourne. After an early career in radio, Rob moved successfully to television, firstly at Channel 10, then for the Nine Network. During a media career spanning 21 years, he won ten VFL/AFL media awards, two national Penguin awards and was twice nominated for the Logie Awards for the Best News Story of the year. During his television career, Rob was Aus-

tralia's highest-paid sports correspondent.

Stephen Brown Memorial Scholarship

Stephen Brown taught Information Technology at Maryborough for about 20 years. He was instrumental in introducing and developing the VET course in the School. He was a very popular and innovative teacher who tragically died suddenly in 2001. As he lived in Baringhup, the community decided to donate a scholarship in his memory. This scholarship is to be awarded to a student undertaking VET or Information Technology who always applies themselves to their studies with the same commitment and effort as Stephen demonstrated.

Don Da Fonte Memorial Scholarship

Don Da Fonte was a farmer at Wareek and a long-standing and enthusiastic member of Apex. He was the first Life Member of the Maryborough Apex Club. This award is to assist an able student from Years 7-9, this award is presented in his memory.

Bruce Dellavedova Memorial Scholarship

Bruce was a dedicated family man with a strong loyalty & commitment to his work, sport, charity and various roles within the community. Bruce was an active member of the Highland Society and worked tirelessly at the Highland Gathering and other charity events. He was heavily involved with both the Laanecoorie Dunolly Cricket Club and the Maryborough District Cricket Association where he held various roles over a long period of time. As junior coach, secretary and president he assisted many young cricketers, helping and encouraging them in their chosen sport. Bruce commenced work at Hedges and Bell in 1979 and was in his 38th year with McPhersons Printing. He commenced as an apprentice and quickly worked his way into management roles by showing loyalty, dedication, commitment and leadership. He became a Supervisor before advancing to Production Manager, a role he held for the majority of his working life during which he successfully oversaw significant changes in the printing industry, a testament to his experience, industry knowledge and work ethic. Bruce was a compassionate man who always took the time to listen. He had a remarkable memory and a wealth of knowledge. His attitude was always "How do we make it happen?"

Bill Green Memorial Literature Award

Bill Green was a Lawyer, Investigative Journalist, Press Secretary for Federal Ministries and a writer of numerous screenplays and novels. He had a love of words and a gift for storytelling. Bill was born in Swan Hill in 1940 and lived in Talbot for a number of years before he passed away suddenly in 2011. This award has been developed by his wife Helen, a respected bookseller to support a talented writer in Years 10, 11 or 12. Ellen Humphreys Memorial Scholarship (5)

Ellen was born in 1906 and died in 1992. Her parents were share farmers and Ellen was the eldest of six children. The nearest school, a small rural school, was six kilometers away, which meant a long walk each day, firstly by herself and, later, in charge of her younger brothers and sisters. Although she liked school and wanted to continue, she had to leave school at age 13 to become a housekeeper for the family at home. As she grew older, Ellen realised that many of her lost opportunities in life were due to her lack of education, and always tried to instill in her own children and others the value of what she simply termed 'a proper education.' This scholarship, which will assist the winner through to Year 12, is awarded as an encouragement to students who achieve academic excellence despite having to travel long distances to school.

Alan Moore Memorial Arts Scholarship (1914-2015)

Alan Moore was born in Melbourne in 1914. He began life drawing art classes at age 16. Moore continued to paint at his studio in Avoca until he was 95. He studied at the National Gallery of Victoria Art School, this time completing his studies to obtain a degree. He also studied under J S Watkins in Sydney and he won several art and drawing prizes in Melbourne, including the Grace Joel scholarship prize in 1942.

Robert (Bob) Osborne (OAM) Memorial Scholarship

Robert (Bob) James Osborne OAM in 1961 a young, enthusiastic Maths/Science Teacher arrived at the Maryborough Tech for the start of the new school year, and he stayed there until he retired. Over the decades Bob taught countless students, remaining in contact with many, always taking a keen interest in their achievements following school. Outside teaching and school Bob was a part of many organisations, both community and sporting. He served as a Maryborough City Councillor, being Mayor on three occasions. Involvement in netball, basketball, Apex Rotary, Probus, Goldfields FM to name a few. Bob received multiple awards including several Life Memberships at Local, State and National levels. The ultimate recognition of Bob's efforts was the awarding of an Order of Australia (OAM) for his lifetime contribution to the community.

Bob was the consummate public speaker, being regularly asked to deliver a speech, chair meetings, MC events, or to conduct radio interviews. Bob compared the Carols by Candlelight and Maryborough Tech Debutante Balls for many, many years. In every walk of life, school, community, sport the number of people touched by Bob's generosity of spirit could never be calculated, and his legacy will live on.

Norm Rasmussen Memorial Scholarship

This Scholarship commenced in 2007 and will assist the winner from Year 7 through to Year 12 for the educational life of the student if continuing to attend Maryborough Education Centre and meeting the criteria: to support and assist a student who is striving to reach their full academic/achievement potential.

Myra Martin & Sandra Rich Performance & Dance Memorial Scholarship

Myra Martin dedicated her life to serving her community and continually inspired those around her, Myra taught ballet, tap and musical comedy at her dance school, raising thousands of dollars for the community over 74 years. She also taught ballroom dancing and trained debutants. As well as dance, she choreographed pantomimes and performances throughout this time. San-

dra Rich followed her mother's lead in working for the community and shaping young people in the art of dance and performance. Sandra trained debutants for the Technical College and Education Centre for many years, as well as preparing students for dance concerts for 50 years.

Narina Trickey Memorial Scholarship (2)

Narina Trickey was a dedicated community worker for many, many years who passed away suddenly at a very young age. The award commenced at 2828 where she was a school council president, parent club stalwart and was involved with the Civic Ladies who were a catering group that donated thousands of dollars to the community. This scholarship continued as the school merged into MEC and is awarded to assist Year 6 students on the basis of excellent academic performance, continuing their education at MEC and their contribution to MEC.

Dr K H Tweeddale Memorial Scholarship (2)

Keith Tweeddale, son of a prominent Maryborough businessman, enrolled in the first ever Form 1 (Year 7) at the former Maryborough High School, going on to complete his Leaving Certificate in 1919. After studying dentistry at Melbourne University he set up a practice in Hobart, then Mildura. He was the first Victorian country dentist to complete his doctorate in Dentistry. He enlisted in the army during World War Two and was promoted to Major in the Dental Corps. Setting up a practice in Malvern after the war, he retired in 1976 at the age of 72. This award, for exemplary studentship and academic excellence, is presented in his memory.

Jaycees: Lloyd H Williams Memorial Scholarship

To assist a student with desire to pursue further studies.

Dux Criteria

Year 7-11 and VCAL

The Dux will be awarded to the student with the highest academic results in the graduation year. In defining the recipient the widest range of academic results will be taken into account. Class teachers are able to nominate students to the Year Level Coordinator. The Year Level Coordinator is responsible for making a recommendation to the Principal.

Evidence of achievement may come from:

- · Formal assessment such as On Demand, Essential, VCAA study scores, NAPLAN*, national subject competitions and examinations
- · Consistently high academic performance within classes
- · High engagement in all types of learning.

The Year 12 VCE Dux is awarded to the student with the highest ATAR.

Dux of Year 12- Geoff Lovett School Council Scholarship

Year 12 exam results expected December 30

Geoff Lovett has lived in Maryborough all his life, educated at 404 Primary School, and then the Technical School. He has had a lifetime involved with education locally as a student, parent and school councillor. Geoff served on School Council at Maryborough East Primary (2828) for 11 years. In 1984 he was elected to the Technical College Council, and 12 months later was elected President, a position he held for 14 years. 1994 saw the merge of the Technical and High becoming Maryborough Regional College (M R C). Geoff was elected Foundation President of M R C and served until 1999 when the last of his children completed secondary school. Geoff was elected to the Central Goldfields Shire Council in 1997 and was the first person elected to Central Goldfields Council serving for 20 years. Including 5 terms as Mayor. Whilst on Council Geoff played a central role in the acquisition of the 4 vacated school sites, to ensure that they were used for community benefit: High School to Havilah, Tech School home of Central Goldfields Shire. These developments also include the creation of Station Domain.

Geoff has played an active role in many community organisations, and takes a keen interest in the history of Maryborough. Over the years he has helped save many of the important buildings that survive today.
